DISSERTATION PROJECT

When the Voice Exits: The Political Consequences of Domestic Migration

Abstract: What explains persistent differences in political attitudes, behavior, and outcomes at the sub-national level within the same country? My dissertation project links these political differences to domestic migration. I argue that because domestic migration is selective, it results in a loss of political activists in sending areas, which has at least two important consequences. First, it affects the calculus of mainstream political parties and draws their attention away from these regions. Parties are less likely to campaign and recruit political candidates in sending areas and consider the preferences of voters in these areas less. Second, it decreases aggregate levels of political activism and reduces associational life in sending communities. Both consequences of domestic migration result in political dissatisfaction and increased support for protest and populist parties. My dissertation uses historical data on migration and protest participation in the former German Democratic Republic as well as original data on domestic migration, political activism, election results, and party strategies in contemporary Germany to research the political consequences of domestic migration. In addition, I leverage data on domestic migration, voting patterns, and economic development projects across European regions and examine the political consequences of the Great Migration in the American South.
